SUMMARY OF CONSENT RESOLUTION AGREEMENT

This summary is published under section 54(3) of the Teachers Act to protect the identity of a student who was harmed, abused or exploited by Huston.

1. Huston held a Professional Certificate of Qualification, No. [REDACTED]. It was issued by the B.C. College of Teachers under the *Teaching Profession Act* on August 4, 2004, was valid from September 1, 2004, and was continued under the *Teachers Act* as of January 9, 2012.
2. On November 1, 2025, his Certificate was cancelled under section 37(4) for non-payment of fees.
3. At all material times, Huston was employed as a secondary school teacher by an independent school authority (the “School”) in British Columbia.
4. On January 17, 2025, the Commissioner received a report from a certificate holder, under section 38 of the *Teachers Act*.
5. At the time of the report and after, Huston was not working as a teacher.
6. Huston entered into an inappropriate intimate and sexual relationship with a former student. Huston was aware that the former student was vulnerable. Huston maintained close contact with the student after graduation. The sexual relationship started within five months of the student graduating.
7. On May 26, 2026, Huston entered into a consent resolution agreement with the Commissioner in which Huston admitted that his conduct described in paragraph 6 constitutes professional misconduct under section 63 of the *Teachers Act* and is contrary to Standards #1 and 2 of the *Standards for the Education, Competence and Professional Conduct of Educators in*

British Columbia, Fourth Edition, January 2012.

8. Huston agreed that for a period of 15 years, he will not apply for, and understands the Director will be required not to issue to him, a certificate of qualification, an independent school teaching certificate or any other authorization to teach in the kindergarten to grade 12 education system under section 64(g) of the *Teachers Act*, or any successor legislation.
9. In determining that a 15-year ban on issuance of a certificate or any other authorization is an appropriate consequence, the Commissioner considered the following factors:
 - a. Huston breached his position and power and trust as a teacher to engage in an intimate and sexual relationship with the student.
 - b. Huston was aware that the student was vulnerable to Huston's advances because of the personal relationship that Huston had fostered with the student.
 - c. Huston's conduct had the effect of abusing or exploiting the student, who suffered harm as a result of the conduct.
10. Huston agreed that he will not make any statement orally or in writing which contradicts, disputes or calls into question the terms of the consent resolution agreement or the admissions made in it.
