SUMMARY OF CONSENT RESOLUTION AGREEMENT

This summary is published under section 54(3) of the Teachers Act, which excludes certain details to protect the identity of a student who was harmed, abused or exploited by the Teacher.

- 1. The Teacher holds a valid Professional Certificate of Qualification. It was issued by the B.C. College of Teachers under the *Teaching Profession Act* on December 17, 1990, is valid from September 1, 1990, and was continued under the *Teachers Act* as of January 9, 2012.
- 2. At all material times, the Teacher was employed as a teacher at a school (the "School") in a school district (the "District").
- 3. On May 29, 2023, the District made a report to the Commissioner regarding the Teacher, under section 16 of the *School Act* indicating that as a result of a District investigation, on May 25, 2023, the District disciplined the Teacher by:
 - a. Suspending the Teacher for seven (7) days without pay; and
 - b. Requiring the Teacher to attend the Justice Institute of British Columbia (JIBC) course "Reinforcing Respectful Professional Boundaries" which the Teacher completed in March of 2023.
- 4. The following events took place:
 - a. The Teacher taught Student A at the School.
 - b. The Teacher communicated regularly with Student A about personal, non-school

- related matters, outside of school hours from the summer of 2022 to the end of February 2023.
- c. The Teacher hugged Student A on two occasions.
- d. Student A confided in the Teacher and shared personal information regarding Student A's family life and other difficulties.
- e. Student A's parents asked the Teacher to stop communicating with Student A about personal matters that were not school related, and which were outside of school hours.
- f. The Teacher did not stop communicating with Student A until approximately 10 days after being asked to do so.
- 5. The Teacher entered into a consent resolution agreement with the Commissioner, in which the Teacher admitted the conduct set out in paragraph 4 constitutes professional misconduct under section 63 of the *Teachers Act* and is contrary to Standard #1 and Standard #4 of the *Professional Standards for BC Educators*, June 2019. The Teacher agreed to a three-day suspension of his certificate of qualification under sections 53 and 64(b) of the *Teachers Act*.
- 6. In determining that a three-day suspension and completion of the course required by the District were appropriate consequences, the Commissioner considered the following factors:
 - a. The Teacher failed to maintain appropriate boundaries in his communication and interactions with Student A;
 - b. The Teacher failed to take appropriate steps to manage the well-being of Student A;
 - c. The Teacher undermined Student A's family trust and confidence in the educational system by disregarding the family's request to stop communicating with Student A about non-school related matters and communication outside of school hours;
 - d. The Teacher accepted responsibility for his conduct.
