SUMMARY OF CONSENT RESOLUTION AGREEMENT

This summary is published under section 54(3) of the Teachers Act to protect the identity of students who were harmed, abused or exploited by the teacher.

1. The Teacher holds a valid Professional Certificate of Qualification, No. [REDACTED]. It was issued by the B.C. College of Teachers under the *Teaching Profession Act* on December 31, 1992, is valid from January 1, 1993, and was continued under the *Teachers Act* as of January 9, 2012.
2. At all material times, the Teacher was employed as an elementary school teacher by a school district in British Columbia (the “District”) at a District school (the “School”).
3. On November 5, 2025, the District made a report to the Commissioner regarding the Teacher, under section 16 of the *School Act*.
4. The following occurred, while the Teacher was teaching a grade 5 class at the School:
 - a. Student A was a vulnerable student in the Teacher’s class.
 - b. When Student A refused to listen to the Teacher’s direction, the Teacher tipped Student A’s chair, while Student A was seated in it. As a result, Student A fell and hit their head on a table, causing Student A to become upset and cry.
 - c. The Teacher did not report Student A’s injury to the School administration. The Teacher spoke to the principal and requested that the principal come to the classroom to speak with Student A.
 - d. Student A reported their injury and how it occurred to the principal.
5. On November 3, 2025, the District disciplined the Teacher by suspending them for one

day.

6. On [REDACTED], the Teacher entered into a consent resolution agreement with the Commissioner in which the Teacher admitted that their conduct described in paragraph 4 above constitutes professional misconduct under section 63 of the *Teachers Act* and is contrary to Standards #1 of the *Professional Standards for B.C. Educators*, June 2019.
7. In the consent resolution agreement, the Teacher agreed to a one-day suspension of their certificate of qualification under sections 53 and 64(b) of the *Teachers Act*.
8. The Teacher further agreed that by September 8, 2026, the Teacher will complete the course, *Creating a Positive Learning Environment* through the Justice Institute of British Columbia, under sections 64(f) and (h) of the *Teachers Act*.
9. In determining that a one-day suspension and coursework are appropriate consequences, the Commissioner considered the following factors:
 - a. The Teacher did not maintain a safe learning environment for their students.
 - b. The Teacher failed to model the appropriate behaviour expected of an educator.
10. The Teacher agreed that they will not make any statement orally or in writing which contradicts, disputes or calls into question the terms of the consent resolution agreement or the admissions made in it.
